
It is rare to bring up the case of the Radium Girls in conversation without having to explain their importance in history, which is a great shame as their story should be known. It is for this reason that we are delighted to present **These Shining Lives**, a tribute to the women who lost their lives fighting against worker injustice. We see Catherine Donohue (Michelle Moore) reflecting on her life working in Ottawa, Illinois, and the events at Radium Dial that caused her to die at the terribly young age of 35 in 1938. We see the women encouraged to lick their radium covered brushes to make a point, dismissed when they become ill as a result, and their resulting case against the Radium Dial Company which changed Illinois law for the better.

These Shining Lives is full of complex, challenging roles for young actors. The chemistry between the women is fantastic and I've enjoyed the camaraderie shown between Catherine and her friends, Frances, Charlotte and Pearl (Megan-Alice Reilly, Fiona MacPherson, Laura Dean). I've been blessed to work with experienced and talented actors who have made the parts their own, from our loving and honest Tom Donohue (Benjamin Turner) to our sly and guilt ridden Mr Reed (Drew Howard). I've been honoured to have Emma Kirkham by my side all the way in her role as stage manager, she has often solved problems before they even arise and we could not have done this without her. The dedication and creativity shown by my cast and crew has been inspiring, and I really hope you are as moved by this production as I am.

Two auditions take place within the next month. On Sunday 20th January, Peter Wood will be looking for three performers - two women, one man. The play is Lucy Kirkwood's **The Children**; a fascinating, thought-provoking and unsettling play, with a strong line of humour underpinning the challenging storyline. It offers superb opportunities to the actors, all with a playing age around their sixties.

Then we are delighted to welcome another new director to the Barn: Phil Rowe, who was recently seen as Lord Byron in last season's *Blood and Ice*. He will be directing the Lorca's superb classic **Yerma**, which not only needs the iconic central young woman driven to madness by her desire for a child, but a strong ensemble cast of both sexes, a wide age range and various abilities in musicality and movement. This will be a tremendous opportunity to take part in another exciting project with a strong group dynamic and plenty of creativity. Auditions for the name role take place on Sunday 27 January, and for all other roles on Sunday 3 February - both at 7pm.


Coming Soon

Confusions

by Alan Ayckbourn | Directed by Cassie Tillett & Clare Williamson

21-23, 27-28 Feb, 1-2 March 2019

From babies to babes, politicians to vicars, tea urns to toys, dinner and doubts, Alan Ayckbourn offers us a wry view of 1970s suburban Britain. In a sequence of five, interconnected one-act plays, all loosely linked by characters or locations, a cast of five play more than 20 parts and morph through a bewildering range of wigs, costumes and accents.



Better known for his high speed farce, here Ayckbourn explores hypocrisy and loneliness in middle England through series of comic snapshots which view life with a slightly skewed eye, asking the audience, are these people pitiful, or just plain ridiculous?

Artistic Directors Cassie & Clare have taken over direction of this show due to unforeseen changes in circumstances for Angela Rowe, who we look forward to welcoming back in the future. They have assembled a superb team of actors and a first-rate crew, and are already much enjoying creating Ayckbourn's darkly humorous observations of 1970s life.
